“It was 2002 when the war started and we ran away from our country. I came with my parents as well to the Kakuma refugee camp and then some years back, either 2007 or 2008, they went back to Sudan. But we didn’t just run from our country because of war, if my parents could not have even brought us to Kenya I could have even died and so could my siblings and parents.”

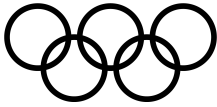

And it was too hot and sometimes the foot can get injured so we are running without shoes, and we ran 10km and I came second in that race which I was have this chance to be selected as one of the best runners.”

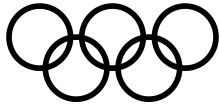

QUESTION: How do you feel about being part of the refugee team?

“Well I don't have any knowledge on me, but it depends when we come together and meet in the stadium we interact with so many people and maybe make friends and become one team because there is no segregation, just become one team, and participate with each other and the Olympics brings people together.”

QUESTION: How do you feel about staying in the Olympic Village?

“Well, I feel very happy and glad, because I will meet many people and interact with different people so it will allow us to be united and come together as well. Sometimes you can make friendships and just make a lot of friends and interact together so that there is no segregation, we come as a team.”

QUESTION: Have you ever experienced discrimination?

“Yeah well, sometimes that does happen because maybe someone from another country, maybe that person will not feel good about you and just embarrass you and sometimes abuse you, so running from the country is what you do, you're not feeling happy because you are running away from your country and going to someone's country, that person is not good.”

QUESTION: What happened to your parents?

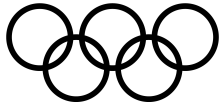
“Well I don't know, maybe after they brought us back to Kenya, during the time when they left people, the soldiers during the time they were coming I was just too young and they brought us up to Kenya - I've never seen them after that.”

QUESTION: What would have happened had you stayed in South Sudan?

“Well, maybe they could've kidnapped me those people, and also I could've been killed because they were fighting, and yeah.”
